From the Desk of Chairman



Dear Professional Colleagues,

Recently I came across a study of 51 top nations in terms of GDP. Interestingly India is amongst the only 12 nations that showed growth in GDP during 2009. At 7.40% growth India was next only to China 8.70%. By 2015, India is projected to have a growth of 95% over 2009 figures. In real terms we have only

China at 103% and Russia at 99% in the competition. In fact countries like France, Italy, Spain and Netherlands are expected to grow less than 10% over this 6 year period. Even countries like USA, Japan and Germany are expected to grow by less than 25%.

Whereas India is the 12th largest economy in 2009 in terms of overall GDP, we are at the bottom of the pyramid as far as per capita GDP is concerned at about \$1000. This is one of the indicators of the wide gap between the upper and lower classes of the strata in the Indian population. This is where the need for inclusive growth is evident.

I was fortunate to be able to attend the inauguration of the India Corporate week in New Delhi on the 14th of December. I was especially keen to listen to our Hon. Prime Minister on his take on the theme of the Week "Sustainable Business". Being a finance man himself, the Hon. P.M. made a very interesting statement. "India is facing a problem of Ethical Deficit" is what he said and that my friends sums up the real challenge that India is facing today which must be overcome in order to achieve the growth that is envisaged and also bridge the gap between the upper and lower strata of our population.

In line with the guidelines given by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs we at WIRC conducted 2 programs under the "India Corporate Week" in Mumbai. Chapters in our region especially Surat & South Gujrat, Baroda, Nagpur and Bhopal also conducted excellent programs.

The Maharashtra State Electricity Distribution Co. Ltd. (MSEDCL) has decided to form a panel of audit firms (CA / CWA Firms) for conducting risk based Internal Audit of

various functions of the company for the FY 2010-11. I invite our members in practice to make the most of this opportunity. The Cost Audit Branch of the Ministry of Corporate Affairs has issued 115 New Cost Audit Orders after a long gap of several years. Whereas this is a welcome move it must not hinder the process of implementation of the Expert Group recommendations where all the companies (having turnover in excess of Rs. 50 Crore) are recommended to be brought under the purview of the Cost Audit.

The Regional Cost Conference of WIRC was hosted by the Kalyan and Ambernath Chapter of Cost Accountants on the 24th and 25th of December. I must say that the conference was a grand success thanks to the untiring efforts put in by the Chapter members. Special mention must be made here of CMA Narasimhan the Chairman of the Convention Committee, CMA Shamnani the Chairman of the Chapter and CMA Aruna Soman for their focused efforts.

This month we conducted a CEP program on 11th December 2011, at Students' & Members' Facilitation Centre, Thane. Mr. Naresh Bhatt, Managing Director, NRB Laboratories (I) Pvt. Ltd spoke on "Role of Cost Accountant in improving the bottom line for the organization by Quality Management System (QMS). The CEP received excellent response from our members.

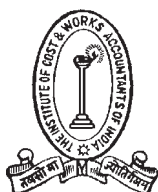

Import of Services - Effective Date of Applicability

'Service tax' was introduced for the first time under Chapter V of the Finance Act, 1994, After making constitutional amendment by inserting Article 268 A for Service Tax levy by Union Government, collected and appropriated by the Union Government. Section 66 of the Act was the charging section and provided for a levy of service tax at the rate of 5 % of the value of the 'taxable service'. 'Taxable service' was defined in section 65 to include only three services now it is reached up to almost 133 and if wide scope of definition is considered then almost all services other than Government, Education, Health & Legal Services (to some extent) are covered.

The Section 68 required every person providing the 'taxable service' to collect 'service tax' at the specified rate. Section 69 provided for the registration of a person responsible for collecting service tax. Sub-section (2) of section 65 indicated that it was the provider of the service who was responsible for collecting the tax and obliged to get registered. Sections 65, 66, 68 and 69 were subsequently amended, though the remaining sections continued as originally enacted with minor changes. But there was no service tax in case of import of services, the Government of India, Ministry of Finance vide Service Tax Circular No. 36/4/2001, dated 8-2-2001 of clarified that services provided beyond the territorial waters of India are not liable to service tax, as provisions of service tax had not been extended to such areas. On March 1, 2002, Notification No. 1/2002-ST, dated 1-3-2002 was issued by which the provisions of Chapter V of the Finance Act, 1994 were extended to the Continental Shelf and Exclusive Economic Zone of India, now this notification is rescinded by 14/2010-S.T. dated 27-02-2010.

Further in the interest of principal equity and to protect India service provider, Government created a legal fiction and make the recipient of service liable to pay service tax in case of import of service. Therefore, in accordance with the Section 94 empowered to the Central Government to make Rules for carrying out the provisions of Chapter V of the Finance Act, 1994, inserted the clause (vi) in Sub-rule (d) of Rule 2 of the Service Tax Rules, 1994 w.e.f. 16th August 2002. By this provision while defining the term 'person liable to pay service tax', a person, who receives service is make liable for payment of service tax since government has no direct enforcement power against foreign service provider.

Accordingly Department started collecting service tax, But the Article 265 of the Constitution lays down that no tax shall be levied or collected except by the authority of law and section 94 supra provides that Rules are made for to carry out the provisions of main Act i.e. Finance Act, and Sub-section (2) a) of section 94 provides as follows:

Quote

94 Power to make rule

- (1) The Central Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, make rules for carrying out the provisions of this Chapter.
- (2) In particular, and without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing power, such rules may provide for all or any of the following matters, namely:-
 - (a) Collection and recovery of service tax under section 66 & 68;
 - (b) -----

Unquote

In view of above provision, the clause (vi) inserted in Rule 2 (d) becomes redundant since there is no such provision in section 66 & 68 as per the ratio laid down by Hon'ble Supreme Court in *Laghu Udhog Bharti v. Union of India*, 1999 (112) E.L.T. 365 (S.C.). Being Central Government failed in its intention, issued a Notification No. 36/2004-ST, dated 31-12-2004 w.e.f. 01-01-2005 notified the certain taxable services for the purposes of section 68(2) of the Finance Act, 1994, and it was further provided that any taxable service by a person who is a non-resident or is from outside India, or does not have any office in India, is eligible to tax. Further on 16th June, 2005, an amendment was made in the Finance Act, 1994 by which an Explanation was added below section 65(105), to provide that if a service is provided by a person who does not have permanent residence in India, to a person having permanent residence in India it is deemed to be a 'taxable service'. These provisions led to dispute on date of applicability of service tax on import of service. Hence the issue whether service recipient is liable for tax from 16-8-2002 or from 1-1-2005, was referred to Larger Bench of CESTAT in case of *Hindustan Zinc Ltd. Vs CCE, Jaipur*, 2008 (11) S.T.R. 338 (Tri. - LB), the Larger Bench held that recipient of service is liable to pay service tax from 01-01-2005 since the dispute pertains to the period from January 2004 to July 2005 and the Hon'ble Supreme Court dismissed the Appeal filed by the Department for the reason of No Merits.

Thereafter, the section 66A was inserted in the Finance Act, 1994 with effect from 18th April 2006 to provide reverse charges mechanism for 'Charge of service tax on services received from outside India'; which the Government ought to have been done much before and one more date is added in dispute of applicability. Finally the Hon'ble Bombay High Court in case of *Indian National Shipowners Association v. Union of India* [2009 (13) S.T.R. 235 (Bom.)] settled the issue which is upheld by the Hon'ble

Supreme Court of India. In this case High Court held that Person providing service alone regarded as an assessee as per Chapter V of Finance Act, 1994, Rule 2(1)(d)(iv) *ibid* w.e.f. 16th August 2002 cannot be framed as not to carry the purpose of the Chapter V *ibid*. though the service provided from outside India as per Explanation to Section 65(105) *ibid* w.e.f. 16th June 2005, but charge being on service provider, petitioners not liable to pay tax because statutory provision absent before enactment of Section 66A of Finance Act, 1994, recipient in India liable to Service tax for service received from abroad from 18-4-2006 i.e. after enactment of Section 66A only.

Import of Service Rules has been notified w.e.f 19.04.2006. It is also important to note that CBEC clarified in Circular 111/05/2009 ST dated 24.02.2009 that services will be treated as received in India when benefit is accrued in India even if service is performed outside India.

To conclude, any services availed from outside India and accounted in Books of Accounts are to be classified under Import of Services as if these are availed from Service Provider in India under Reverse Charge Mechanism, Service Tax is required to be paid in cash and avail Cenvat Credit in accordance with Cenvat Credit Rules, 2004. ■

INFRASTRUCTURE - AN OPINION

CMA K. Kanakasabhpathy (M 3666)

I am not a voracious reader on the professional front. Nor am I a conference-man. Yet, I do read articles and attend conferences once a while. The following dissertation, naturally suffers from some limitations. The context for the present piece is the recently concluded Regional Cost Conference at Kalyan, where the theme was 'Emerging Challenges to Sustain Growth and Build Competitiveness'. One of the sub-themes was 'Infrastructure'.

In the technical session on 'infrastructure', we had very enlightening discussions by eminent speakers who emphasised on 'infrastructure' as an immediate need for furthering economic growth. Frequent mention was made of the need for world class roads, airports, power, telecommunication etc. These indeed are essential infrastructure facilities for a developing economy. These are of the nature of tangible assets. No mention was made in the technical session on 'infrastructure' of the need to create intangible assets like human resource with appropriate skill-sets, the need to develop work culture etc, though these are equally important for economic growth. In fact even the creation of tangible assets as infrastructure cannot be achieved without the intangible assets mentioned. Often innovation and technology will fail if it is not matched by appropriate skill sets at the operational level. If these are in short supply, there will be a tendency to make do with available resources. And 'world class' will be a casualty.

Apparently physical assets have visibility and are easier to comprehend. Intangible assets have on the other hand to be conceived in the mind. Though intangible assets were not discussed in the technical session, the topic indeed found mention in the message of conference committee's chairman as published in the souvenir. Even the guest of honour of the day made a passing reference to these.

Macro economics tend to be measured through GDP. GDP as a sole measure of economic well-being is not acceptable in this era enlightened awareness. Poverty and starvation coexist with the present economic boom. This needs to be corrected not only from the point of view of the sociologist but also from the point of view of hardcore economist. No economic growth can sustain for long without inclusiveness. There is need for inclusive growth to correct the imbalances that have crept into the economy. To achieve inclusive growth, we need what has come to be termed 'soft-infrastructure'. Soft-infrastructure includes basic education to everybody, a large base of human resource with appropriate skill sets, enhanced bureaucratic efficiency, workable mechanism

to counter corruption, a healthy work-culture, a culture of excellence, a desire for change etc. A few illustrations will hopefully help understand the concept of soft-infrastructure in a growing economy.

Government is moving away from being a doer to being an enabler. It is being increasingly recognised that genuine development is something that the people will achieve on their own if allowed to do so without hindrance.

Unique Identification Project is an attempt to use technology to improve the delivery system in a number of spheres.

Spread of Broadband Networks to reach deep into the country will ensure connectivity at the grassroots level. One of the major gains will be smooth price discovery.

RTI has been a major legislative move as a workable mechanism to counter corruption.

Men with excellent technology leadership qualities are emerging to come forward to play a national role ahead of their individual comforts and convenience. They stand to support the political leadership to achieve targets. Nandan Nilekani and Sam Pitroda can be cited as examples.

Azim Premji has chosen to move from being purely a successful corporate tsar to the public national arena. He has committed a good part of his enormous personal wealth, his talent and energy to public good in areas where government efforts are found to be inadequate. He is into complex problem areas such as basic education with a fresh mind. He does not wait for innovation to happen. He has started to scout for innovators and problem solvers.

There are fresh initiatives on the health front from non governmental agencies. New operating models are emerging as attempts at a wider reach and affordability on the health front.

True every initiative will find resistance from vested interests, will encounter constraints at operational level and even find conflict of interest among themselves if the targets are not well defined.

The change drivers mentioned are by no means exhaustive. They are only illustrative. The present article will have served its purpose if it helps triggers a full scale discussion on the role of soft-infrastructure in sustaining economic growth.

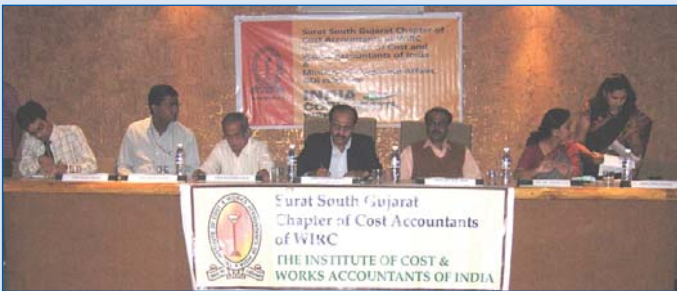
